On 25 March 2018, you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

- Information on the amount of people in the West Auckland/Waitemata area currently in emergency accommodation and for the past year.
- The amount of people that are currently waiting for emergency accommodation to become available in the West Auckland/Waitemata area and how long they have been waiting for. Thank you for your help in this matter.

Where transitional housing or public housing is not available or appropriate for those in immediate need, the Ministry may grant an Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant to assist with the cost of temporary emergency accommodation.

In July 2016, the non-recoverable Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant was introduced. The grant supports people and families with the cost of short term accommodation in times of urgent need. Please find enclosed a table that shows the number of distinct clients in receipt of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants, and the number of grants made, for the Auckland Metro Area, by site, between 1 January 2017 and 31 December 2017. If the Ministry becomes aware of a person or family in need of emergency accommodation, and public housing or transitional housing is not available, the Ministry will assist them to find and pay for emergency accommodation immediately, the person or family do not wait for emergency accommodation to become available. As such, there are no people waiting for emergency accommodation to become available.

You are likely to also be interested in information about the Social Housing Register. Households on the Social Housing Register are in a range of circumstances, including:

- Living in public housing but awaiting a transfer (for instance to a different region or to a different sized property due to a change in circumstances);
- Staying with friends or family;
- · Renting;
- Or, as outlined above, in transitional housing provided by the Ministry or in receipt of an Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant.

The Social Housing Register consists of the Housing Register and the Transfer Register. The Housing Register records those who are not currently in public housing

but who have been assessed as eligible for public housing. The Transfer Register represents those already in public housing who are eligible to be rehoused, generally due to a change in circumstances prompting a move to somewhere more appropriate to their needs.

Clients eligible for public housing are placed on a register according to their priority rating. The Social Housing Register is dynamic rather than static, and it changes as people's circumstances and situations change. Placing people and families into public housing accommodation is about matching them with the right property in the area they want to live. Those assessed as having a greater need for housing will be prioritised higher. As people's needs change their priority and place on the register may change also.

Households on the Register with the highest needs are placed in public housing if they can be matched to suitable accommodation. Others may leave the Register because they make their own arrangements or their circumstances change.

Sometimes clients on the register may have an emergency housing need. Generally, clients can remain on the register while their emergency housing need is responded to, as emergency housing is temporary.
