On 9 and 11 January 2018 you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, information regarding social housing.

I would like to extend my apologies for the delay in responding to your request for information. In addition, as this response contains a large amount of information, should you want clarification I am happy to arrange us to to discuss this response further with you, if required.

The Ministry transferred the following to Housing New Zealand, as this information is more closely aligned with their function:

- The total number of houses, flats/units and all other living quarters permanently classified as social housing by the Ministry of Social Development, separated under the territorial authority each is contained in and type of abode, for the five years ending December 2017. This should include both properties owned by MSD/HNZ and other agencies.
- The portion of your request relating to figures prior to 2015.

For clarity, the remainder of your questions will be responded to in turn. Where you have requested figures for the last five years, I have provided them for the last three, as Housing New Zealand is providing you with a response to your request relating to figures prior to 2015.

• The total number of occupied houses, flats/units and all other living quarters permanently classified as social housing by the Ministry of Social Development, separated under the territorial authority each is contained in and type of abode, for the five years ending December 2017. This should include both properties owned by MSD/HNZ and other agencies.

Table 1, which is attached as an appendix, provides the number of public housing tenancies broken down by Territorial Authority and number of bedrooms as at end of December from 2015 to 2017.

- The average income of all people on the social housing register for the past five years, ending December 2017.
- The average income of all people living in social housing over the past five years, ending December 2017.

Public housing tenants with low incomes may have their rent subsidised by the Income Related Rent (IRR) scheme. The Ministry of Social Development calculates the rate of IRR a tenant will pay, based on a client's assessable income and their household type, and the social housing provider charges this rate as rent to the client. If the rate of IRR calculated is higher than the market rent rate for the property the housing provider will charge the market rent rate as rent to the client. If the rate of IRR calculated is lower than the market rent rate or agreed rent rate for the property, the Ministry pays the provider an Income Related Rent Subsidy (IRRS) to make up the difference.

Please note, a client who is paying rent to a registered community housing provider for a property that is not contracted for IRR purposes may receive an Accommodation Supplement, a separate kind of accommodation subsidy.

## Note for tables 2 and 3:

- This table includes only those clients for whom income details are available
- The average assessable income is the net weekly income of the household used to calculate income related rent for the tenancy.
- The average rental cost of Housing New Zealand properties over the past five years, ending December 2017.

The average amount of rent charged by Housing New Zealand is the average amount of IRR set by the Ministry and paid by the tenant.

• Information about what is required for an individual to be added to the social housing register, and how that has changed, if at all, over the past five years.

Clients eligible for social housing are placed on a register according to their priority rating. The Social Housing Register is dynamic rather than static, and it changes as people's circumstances and situations change. Placing people and families into social housing accommodation is about matching them with the right property in the area they want to live. Those assessed as having a greater need for housing will be prioritised higher. As people's needs change their priority and place on the register may change also.

The Social Allocation System is the assessment tool used to process applications for public housing. This series of questions assesses an applicant's need for public housing and prioritises that need as either 'at risk' (priority A) or 'serious' (priority B). The questions asked relate to five criteria:

- adequacy—focuses on the physical condition/structure of the current house and availability of basic facilities
- suitability—focuses on crowding, lack of security of tenure of current accommodation and medical and personal needs
- affordability—focuses on the ability to afford alternative, suitable housing in the private market
- sustainability—focuses on financial management difficulties and difficulties in social skills
- accessibility—focuses on the ability to access and afford suitable and adequate housing as a result of discrimination, lack of financial means to move and availability of alternative, affordable suitable housing in the private market.

Across each of the five criteria, applicants can score between 1 and 4. A score of 1 for any criteria means that that applicant has low or no need in that area and a score of 4 means they are at risk. For an applicant to be Priority A they need to score 4 on at least one criteria and have any other rating greater than 1. Priority B applicants have the highest score of 3 across the five criteria and have any other rating greater than 1.

After assessments of eligibility for public housing were transferred from Housing New Zealand to the Ministry in April 2014, the assessment was reviewed and some changes in how information is used were made in November 2016, updating the Ministerial Direction on Eligibility for Social Housing, which is available at: <a href="https://www.workandincome.govt.nz/map/legislation/ministerial-directions/eligibility-for-social-housing-direction/index.html">www.workandincome.govt.nz/map/legislation/ministerial-directions/eligibility-for-social-housing-direction/index.html</a>.

The changes to the Ministerial Direction meant that clients with previously hidden needs are able to be assisted more quickly through getting a higher priority on the housing register. The changes allowed for:

- the adequacy criteria to better consider clients' circumstances when they are not living in any accommodation (eg homeless) or when they are living in emergency housing, along with the physical standard of a house, any overcrowding being experienced, and a lack of security of tenure.
- the suitability criteria to better represent health, disability or personal issues of the household, and presence of threats to health or safety due to family or other violence, that impact on the person's need to move.

• Percentages of types of employment held by people who applied for social housing over the past five years, separated by each year (eg. 2017: Unemployed, 30 per cent; permanent full time, 30 percent etc.)

I am unable to provide you with this information as it is not a data field that can be reported on, rather, where this information is held, it will be in notes on individual case files. In order to provide you with this information Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of files. As such, I refuse your request under section 18(f) of the Official Information Act. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

• The average time spent living in social housing for each of the five years ending December 2017, separated by territorial authority.

As on-going tenancies do not have an end date, the Ministry does not report on continuous tenancy durations in such a way that averages can be calculated. Table 5, which is attached as an appendix, shows the number of social housing tenancies as at the end of each year from 2015 to 2017, broken down by Territorial Authority and duration bands.

- The longest social housing tenancy term reached in each territorial authority over the five years ending December 2017.
- The shortest time a tenant has spent living in social housing for each of the five years ending December 2017, separated by territorial authority.
- Each of the rent increases for the tenancy, dated at the time they were incurred, for each of the longest tenancies under each territorial authority

Providing this information by Territorial Authority may allow for the identification of the individuals concerned. As such a breakdown of this information by Territorial

Authority is refused under section 9(2)(a) of the Act in order to protect the privacy of natural persons. The need to protect the privacy of these individuals outweighs any public interest in this information.

Please note, a tenancy is not attached to a specific individual, and therefore depending on the household's circumstances, it is possible for a tenancy to have more than one primary tenant over the duration of the tenancy. The Ministry is unable to provide information on the longest tenancy attached to a single primary tenant. As such, the current primary tenant in the longest tenancy nationwide, as detailed in the table below, was not the primary tenant at the start of the tenancy.

## Note:

- Tenancy durations have been rounded to the nearest whole unit.
- Housing New Zealand manages a small number of tenancies that have lifetime tenure and these result primarily from a decision to buy Auckland City Council's pensioner and residential housing in 2002. Housing New Zealand is contractually obliged to honour the Council's undertaking to provide a guarantee of accommodation for life for tenants at that time. There are a small number of people under a Lifetime Tenure agreement.
- The reason(s) why each of the shortest tenancies in each territorial authority was terminated.

If recorded, this information is held by the housing provider, not the Ministry. As such, your request is refused under section 18(g) of the Official Information Act as the information you have requested is not held by the Ministry and I have no grounds to believe that the information is held by another department or Minister of the Crown or organisation.

• The overall number of tenancy terminations

In table 7 overleaf, you will note two spikes in the number of tenancies ended, which are the result of transfers from Housing New Zealand to two community housing suppliers: Tamaki Regeneration Company in the quarter ending March 2016 and Accessible Properties Limited in the quarter ending March 2017. The tenants in the properties remained, but the change of property manager is recorded in Ministry data as tenancies ending and starting.
