On 10 September 2019, you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

 How many Ministry of Social Development clients have had benefit reductions, when a sole parent supported by benefit does not name the other parent in accordance with section 192 (formerly section 70a) of the Social Security Act 2018, in the last ten years?

Section 192 (formerly Section 70A) requires the Ministry to reduce the payment of a main benefit in respect of a dependent child where beneficiary fails to fulfil obligations relating to child support, like naming the other parent and applying for child support when required. Section 193 of the Social Security Act 2018 provides a number of exemptions to these reductions where there is a good reason not to identify the other parent, such as where this would result in a risk of violence.

From 1 April 2020, the sanction which reduces a client's benefit if they do not name the other parent of their child and apply for child support will be removed. This will reduce the additional financial pressure on these parents as a result of the reduction.

The table below shows the number of working age clients with section 192 reductions applied, as at the end of June from 2010 to 2019.

## Notes:

- The table includes working age caregivers only (18 to 64 years)
- A caregiver may have one or more section 192 deductions and/or exemptions in place at the same time relating to different children in their care.
- The caregivers may not be a sole parent.
