On 9 June 2020, you emailed the Ministry of Social Development (the Ministry) requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act), the following information in relation to Child Care Subsidy (CCS):

1. Number of Childcare Subsidy recipients since the last two increases in the minimum wage and whether there is any correlation between subsidy eligibility and minimum wage movement.

On 10 June 2020, you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Act, the following information in relation to CCS:

- 2. Number of applications and requests for Childcare Subsidies that have been made since the country returned to Alert Level 2 (and including now Level 1);
 - how many have been addressed;
 - how many remain outstanding;
 - o and the expected processing time.

During your phone conversation with the Advisor on 30 June 2020, you confirmed that, as the recent increase to the minimum wage (question one), and Alert Level 2 (question two) both commenced during the June 2020 quarter, you were happy to wait for the June quarter figures to be available in order for the Ministry to provide a sufficient response.

Work and Income provides income support and employment services throughout New Zealand and offers a single point of contact for New Zealanders needing worksearch support, income support and in-work support.

Work and Income also administers CCS and the Out of School Care and Recreation subsidy which provides financial support for childcare, based on a person's income and the number of children they have.

CCS is a non-taxable payment that aims to assist clients with dependent children to undertake and remain in employment, education or training which a client can receive for up to 50 hours a week. Notes:

· The previous two minimum wage adjustments occurred in April 2019 and April 2020.

With reference to your request for the number of applications and requests for CCS since the country went into Alert Level 2, the Ministry is unable to provide the information in the form which you have requested as it is outside the Ministry's standard reporting. For this reason, the Ministry is also unable to provide the number of applications that remain outstanding. To meet the intent of your request, the Ministry has provided the number of applications processed broken down by the outcome in **Table Two** below.

Table Two: Number of CCS applications processed for each quarter from 01 January 2020 to 30 June 2020, broken down by the applications granted and declined

June 2020	5,219	4,130	1,089

Notes:

- This is a count of applications granted or declined, not a count of clients.
- A client may have more than one grant or decline in a period.
- Processed applications are the sum of all approved and all declined applications.
