Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we've explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between 1 and 21 nights accommodation at a time.





Emergency Housing - Over the month and historic numbers






Commentary


Both the number of grants and the amount of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants granted decreased in April. This was driven by fewer working days in April and a reduction in the number of clients receiving EH SNGs over the month. This monthly decrease is consistent with seasonal trends from the previous two years, which saw small peaks in the number of clients and grants in March before a reduction again in April.


The number of households in Emergency Housing at the end of the month reduced for the first time since January to 4,476 households. Most of the households who left Emergency Housing were shorter duration clients. The average duration grew to 22.8 weeks from 20.7 weeks in March, as clients are staying longer in Emergency Housing.


Emergency Housing - At the end of the month











Public housing Register | 30 Apr 2022

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in Public Housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.






Public housing - Register numbers







Percentage of main applicants, by ethnicity¹










Public housing - Register flow



Commentary

The overall number of applications live on the Public Housing Register continues to increase, up from 32,277 in March to 32,700 in April. All Regions saw increases compared to March, except Taranaki and East Coast.

There were 117 less new applications moving on to the Register in April compared to March. There were also decreases in the number of applications exiting the Register for other reasons (this includes applications that no longer require or are eligible for Public Housing; down 31%) and the number of applications housed (down 3%). These decreases follow usual seasonal trends at this time of year, as public holidays reduce the number of working days in the month, leading to reduced movement within the system.

'MSD reports total response ethnicity.
