



Commentary


In March, the number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants increased 12% to 13,122 grants, while the amount granted increased \$5.8m (18%) to \$37.8m. This is the second highest month for Emergency Housing spend in the last twelve months, after December 2021. This has been driven by an increase in the number of grants, along with growth in the average number of nights funded per grant. These monthly increases reflect seasonal trends, which normally see a small peak in demand throughout March, with numbers reducing again in April.


Since January, the number of households in Emergency Housing has been stable at just over 4,700. However, the number of children increased over the same period, as the proportion of households with children continues to increase, now accounting for 50.7% of current Emergency Housing households.


The average duration increased slightly, up to 20.7 weeks from 20.4 weeks in February.


Emergency Housing - At the end of the month











Public housing Register | 31 Mar 2022 |

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in Public Housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.






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Public housing - Register numbers












Percentage of main applicants, by ethnicity¹

Commentary

The overall number of applications live on the Public Housing Register continues to increase, up from 31,653 in February to 32,277 in March. All Regions saw increases in March.

New entries to the Register grew by 19% this month. However, we also saw a 21% increase in the number of applications housed this month, which mitigated overall growth in the Register.

The number of applications exiting the Register for other reasons (this includes applications that no longer require or are eligible for Public Housing) was stable at just over 1.000.
