Emergency Housing SNGs | Jul 2023 |

Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation at a time





Emergency housing - over the month and historic numbers




Number of households in emergency housing - as at the end of each month

Commentary

The number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants (EH-SNGs) decreased by 348 from last month (a 3.9 percent decrease). There was \$0.6 million less granted during July 2023 than for June 2023 (a 2.0 percent decrease).

The number of households in emergency housing at the end of July increased from June by 39 households (1.1 percent). The Auckland region was the primary driver of this increase (an increase of 51 households in Auckland alone). This may be due to increasing rental costs across the Auckland region.












Household composition - as at end of the month



Public Housing Register | 31 Jul 2023 |

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in public housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.






Public Housing Register numbers









Percentage of applications by bedrooms required 11 - as at end of the month

Commentary

The number of Public Housing Register applications decreased for the second consecutive month, down by 126 (0.4 percent) to 29,619 at the end of July 2023.

There were 231 fewer new applications in July 2023 than in June 2023 (a decrease of 11.6 percent) which drove the decrease. All regions except Auckland, Southern and Other saw a decrease in applications. There was also an increase in the number of applications with a 'Closure Pending' status, up by 660 (34 percent). This increase over July may reflect an increase in register management activity, including outbound calling, over April and May.

Looking at exits, there were 15 less applications housed from June 2023 (2.3 percent) and 18 less applications exiting the register for other reasons (2.2 percent).
