6.2 percent received Jobseeker Support.




Figure 2. All main benefits, timeseries

Figure 3. JS – WR by Regional Council (total)




Figure 4. JS – WR by Regional Council – Māori




Figure 5. JS – WR by Regional Council – NZ European




Figure 6. JS – WR by Regional Council – Pacific peoples





Figure 8. Population proportion, and percentage point change, compared with September 2020

Figure 9. Jobseeker Support – Work Ready, by ethnicity




Figure 10. Jobseeker Support, by gender

From 2 December 2019, a “Gender diverse” option was made available for our clients to choose from. We expect the numbers in this category to increase over time.





Figure 11. Jobseeker Support – Work Ready, by age groups

Figure 13. Supplementary benefits




Figure 14. Hardship assistance




Figure 15. Special Needs Grants for food, by Regional Council




Figure 16. Special Needs Grants for food, by ethnicity
